Ahavat Ĥesed. By R. Yisrael Meir (HaKohen) Kagan of Radin (1838-1933).

Aĥiezer. Responsa by R. Ĥayim Ozer Gradzinski of Vilna, Lithuania (1863-1940).

Ari (AriZal). Pseudonym of R. Yitzĥak Luria of Tzefat, Israel (1534-1572), the most renowned Kabbalist Rabbi, and an important teacher of Torah-law rulings.

Aruĥ. Dictionary of Talmud terms by R. Natan ben Yeĥiel of Rome (c. 1045-1103).

Aruĥ HaShulĥan. Code of Torah Law by R. Yeĥiel Miĥel HaLevi Epstein, Rabbi of Novardok, Russia (1829-1908). It follows the sequence of the *Shulĥan Aruĥ*.

Aruĥ Le'Nair. Analyses on Talmud, by R. Yaacov Etlinger, Germany (1798-1871).

Auerbach, R. Ĥayim Yehuda. One of the founders and first Head of Yeshivas Sha'arei Shamayim, Jerusalem, Israel (1883-1954).

Avnei Neizer. Responsa by R. Avraham Borenstein of Poland (1839-1910).

Avot D'Rabbi Natan. Chapters of ethics, compiled by Rabbi Natan (2nd century).

Baal Halahot Gedolot. One of the earliest Codes of Torah Law, by R. Shimon Kayyara, who is believed to have lived in Babylonia in the ninth century, and to have studied under the Geonim Rabbis of the Academy in Sura, Babylon.

Babylonian Talmud (*Talmud Bavli*). Talmud composed by the Sages in Babylonia (present day Iraq) in the second to the fifth centuries, completed 450-500.

Baĥ. Acronym for *Bayit Ĥadash*, a work of Torah Law by R. Yoel Sirkis of Cracow, Poland (c. 1561-1640).

Bedek HaBayit. Additions to Beit Yosef by R. Yosef Karo. See Karo, R. Yosef.

Be'er Haitev. Explanations of **Shulĥan Aruĥ Even Ha'Ezer**, by R. Yehudah Ashkenazi of Tiktin, Poland (18th century C.E.)

Beit Efraim. Responsa R. Efraim Zalman Margaliot of Brod, Galicia (1762-1828).

Beit Ha'Otzar. Talmudic encyclopedia by R. Yosef Engel, Rabbi of Cracow, Poland, and Vienna, Austria (1859-1919).

Beit Leĥem Yehudah. Gloss by R. Tzvi Catz (1600's) on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Yoreh De'ah*. **Beit Shlomo.** Responsa by R. Shlomo of Skohol, Galicia (1800's).

Beit Shmuel. A leading commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Even Ha'Ezer* (mainly regarding marriage and divorce), by R. Shmuel Faibesh, Germany and Poland (1640-1698).

Beit Ya'akov. Treatise on *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Ya'akov Berav of Spain and Tzefat, Israel (1474-1546). He was the Rabbi of R. Yosef Karo, author of *Shulĥan Aruĥ*.

Beit Yosef. Commentary by R. Yosef Karo on Arba'ah Turim, a code of Torah Law.

Ben Ish Ĥai. Code of Torah law by Chief Rabbi Yosef Ĥayim, Baghdad (1834-1909).

Bereishit Rabbah. Section of Midrash Rabbah on Genesis. See Midrash Rabbah.

Binyan Tzion. Responsa by R. Yaakov Ettlinger of Germany (1798-1871).

Birkei Yosef. Notes by R. Ĥayim Yosef David Azulai on *Shulĥan Aruĥ*. He is known as Ĥida, the acronym of his name. Born in Jerusalem, he traveled extensively in Europe and North Africa, and eventually settled in Livorno, Italy (1724-1807).

Bi'ur HaGra. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ* by the Torah-law authority R. Eliyahu ben Shlomo Zalman of Vilna, Lithuania, known as the Vilna Gaon (1720-1797).

Bi'ur Halaĥa. Additions to *Mishnah Berurah* by the author, R. Yisrael Meir (HaKohen) Kagan of Radin, Poland/Lithuania (1838-1933). See **Ĥofetz Ĥayim**.

Chajes, R. Tzvi Hirsch. Also known as Maharitz Chajes; an author of several works on the nature, extent and authority of the Torah tradition, from Galicia (1805-1855).

Da'at Cohen. Responsa by the first Ashkenazi Chief Rabbi of Israel, R. Avraham Yitzĥak Kook (1865-1935).

Da'at Torah. See Maharsham.

Da'at Zekenim. Insights in Torah, by the Ba'alei (authors of) Tosafot; see Tosafot.

Darkei Moshe. Notes on Tur by R. Moshe Isserles. See Rema.

Devar Yehoshua. Responsa by R. Yehoshua Aharenberg of Israel (1900's).

Disputation at Barcelona, The. Ramban's account and transcript of his famous forced disputation before King James of Aragon; pub. Mosad Harav Kook, 1963.

Divrei Yatziv. Responsa, R. Yekutiel Y. Halberstam, Klausenburger Rebbe (1905-94). *Derashot HaRamban.* Sermons by **Ramban**, pub. Mosad HaRav Kook, Israel.

Eiger, R. Akiva. Chief Rabbi of Poznan, Poland, leader of European Jewry, and author of Rabbinical responsa (1761-1837).

Emunot Ve'De'ot. "Beliefs and Opinions," one of the most important works on Jewish philosophy by R. Saadya Gaon, who was the greatest scholar of the Gaonic period, Head of the Yeshiva in Pumbedita, Babylonia, and leader of Jewry (882-942).

Encyclopedia Talmudica. Published 1969 by Talmudic Encyclopedia Institute, Israel. *Eshkol (Sefer Ha'Eshkol)*. Book of Torah Law by R. Abraham ben Yitzĥak, Head

of the Rabbinical Board and Academy of Narbonne, France (c. 1110-1179).

Ethics of the Fathers (Pirkei Avot). A Tractate of the Mishnah expounding upon ideals of Jewish Torah scholarship, ethics and morals, and deeds of kindness.

Ezer Mikodesh. Notes by R. Avraham David Waherman of Buczacz, Galecia (1771-1840), on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Even Ha'Ezer*.

Gate to the Unity and the Faith (*Shaar HaYiĥud VeHa'Emunah*). A work that explains the unity of God from different perspectives, based on teachings of AriZal and Rabbi Israel Baal Shem Tov, by R. Shneur Zalman of Liadi, Russia (1745-1813). *Ginat Veradim.* Responsa by R. Avraham HaLevi, Head of the Egyptian Rabbinate (1642-1710).

Goldberg, R. Zalman Nehemiah. Noted contemporary authority on Torah Law, and a current member of the Rabbinical High Court in Jerusalem, Israel.

Grandin, Dr. Temple, PhD. Professor at Colorado State University, and a leading expert in guidelines and equipment design for humane slaughter in the meat industry. *Guide for the Perplexed (Moreh Nevuĥim)*. A major work on the foundations and philosophy of Torah, by Rambam. Published by Mosad Harav Kook, Israel, 1977.

Gur Aryeh. Explanations on Pentateuch and Rashi's commentary, by R. Judah Lowe, the Maharal of Prague (1525-1609).

Ha'amek She'ailah. R. Naftali Tzvi Yehuda Berlin's commentary on *She'iltot* (a foundational work of Torah law by Aĥai Gaon). See **Netziv**.

Ĥaĥam Tzvi. Responsa by R. Tzvi Hirsch Ashkenazi of Amsterdam (1656-1718). **Ĥai Gaon, Rav.** The leading Babylonian Rabbinical leader of his time (939-1038).

Ĥasdei David. Explanations on *Tosefta* by R. David Pardo from Venice, who became Chief Rabbi of Sarajewo (1718-1790).

Ĥatam Sofer. Title of the many collected works of R. Moshe Sofer (1762-1839); Chief Rabbi of Pressburg, Slovakia, and leader of Hungarian Jewry.

Ĥavot Yair. Responsa by R. Yair Ĥayim Bacharach of Germany (1638-1702).

Ĥayim Sha'al. Responsa by R. Ĥayim Yosef David Azulai (Ĥida), Israel (1724-1806). **Ĥazon Ish.** Title of the works R. Avraham Yishaya Karelitz, Lithuanian scholar who

Hazon Ish. Title of the works R. Avraham Yishaya Karelitz, Lithuanian scholar who relocated to Bnei Brak. His works cover Talmud and Torah Law (1878-1953).

Ĥelkat Meĥokek. Explanations by R. Moshe Lima of Vilna (1605-1658), on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Even Ha'Ezer*.

Ĥelkat Yoav. Responsa by R. Yoav Weingarten of Końskie, Poland (1848-1922).

Ĥemdat Shlomo. Responsa and insights on Talmud by R. Shlomo Zalman Lifshitz, Chief Rabbi of Warsaw, Poland (1765-1839).

Ĥemdat Yisrael. On *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Meir Dan Plotzki of Poland (1866-1928).

Ĥida. R. Ĥayim Yosef David Azulai (1724-1807). See Birkei Yosef.

Ĥidushei Agadot. Explanations of stories in Talmud, by R. Yehudah Loewe, Chief Rabbi of Prague; better known as the famous Maharal of Prague (1526-1609).

Ĥidushei Hafla'ah. Insights by R. Pinĥas HaLevi Horowitz of Frankfort, Germany (1730-1805), on Tractate *Kidushin*.

Ĥidushei HaRan. See Ran.

Ĥidushei Rav Ĥayim Ha'levi. Torah insights by R. Ĥayim Ha'levi; see **Soloveichik**. **Ĥirkuni**. Torah commentary by R. Ĥazekish ben Manaaĥ of France (c. 1250). It

Ĥizkuni. Torah commentary by R. Ĥezekiah ben Manoaĥ of France (c. 1250). It quotes many obscure Midrash stories and translates many obscure Hebrew words.

Ĥofetz Ĥayim. Torah laws of prohibited evil gossip, by Rabbi Yisrael Meir (Ha-Kohen) Kagan (the famed "Ĥofetz Ĥayim") of Radin, Poland/Lithuania (1838-1933).

Ĥoĥmat Shlomo. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat* by R. Shlomo Kluger of Brode, Galicia (c.1783-1869).

Hok Yaakov. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ* by R. Yaakov Richer Bechofen of Prague (1670-1736).

Hagahot Asheri. Notes on Rosh, by R. Yisroel of Kremz of Austria (1300's).

Hagahot Maimoniot. Notes on *Mishneh Torah* of Rambam, presenting authoritative Ashkenazic practices, by R. Meir HaKohen of Rothenberg, Germany (1237-1299).

Hagahot Mordeĥai. Notes by an unknown author on the *Mordeĥai* by R. Mordeĥai. (R. Mordeĥai lived in Nurenberg, Germany, in the 1200's).

Hagahot Ya'avetz. Notes on Talmud by R. Ya'acov Emdin, Germany (1697-1776). *Hamra V'hayei.* Insights on Tractate *Sanhedrin* by R. Ĥayim Benveniste of Istanbul, Turkey (1603-1673).

Har Tzvi. Responsa by Chief Rabbi Tzvi Pesach Frank of Jerusalem (1873-1961).

Hitorerut Teshuva. Responsa by R. Shimon Sofer of Erloi, Hungary (1860-1944).

Ibn Ezra. R. Avraham Ibn Ezra of Spain, who authored commentary on the entire Hebrew Scriptures; famous for grammatical and linguistic analysis (1089-c.1164).

Iggeret HaRambam (Letter of Rambam) to Rav Ĥasdai HaLevi. A testament of spirituality, which expounds on the spiritual greatness and reward of pious Gentiles.

Iggeret Teiman. Rambam's letter to the Jews of Yemen, urging them to remain steadfast in their faith in spite of religious persecution, forced conversion, and false messianism; includes exposition of fundamental aspects of religious philosophy.

Iggrot Haraiyah. Letters on Jewish philosophy, by the first Ashkenazi Chief Rabbi of Israel, R. Avraham Yitzhak Kook (1865-1935).

Igrot Moshe. Responsa by R. Moshe Feinstein, the leading Torah Law authority of his time and a foremost leader of modern Jewry (1895-1986).

Jerusalem Talmud (*Talmud Yerushalmi*). Talmud composed by the Sages in Israel in the second to the fourth centuries. Although traditionally called the Jerusalem Talmud, it was composed in the Galilee region, since the Romans did not permit the Jews to reside in Jerusalem in that era.

Kapach, R. Yosef (Qafih). Editor of many books of *Rishonim* Sages, including the books by Rambam; leader of the Yemenite community in Israel, 1917-2000.

Karo, R. Yosef. Author of *Shulĥan Aruĥ* (The Code of Jewish Law), *Kesef Mishneh*, and *Beit Yosef*; born in Spain, and later Rabbi in Tzfat, Israel (1488-1575).

Kesef Mishneh. Explanations of Rambam's Mishneh Torah, by R. Yosef Karo.

Ketzot HaĤoshen. Notes on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat*, by R. Aryeh Leib (HaKohen) Heller of Galicia and Metz, France (1745-1813).

Kiryat Sefer. Synopsis of Torah commandments and laws, following Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Moshe ben Yosef Tarani of Tzefat, Israel (1505-1585).

Kitzur Shulĥan Aruĥ. A condensed and concise version by R. Shlomo Ganzfried (Ungar, Hungary, 1804-1886) of the Shulĥan Aruĥ.

Kli Ĥemda. Torah insights by R. Meir Dan Plotzki of Poland (1866-1928).

Knesset HaGedolah. Torah-law points on *Shulĥan Aruĥ* by R. Ĥayim Benveniste of Istanbul, Turkey (1603-1673).

Kol Bo'ai Ha'Olom. Excerpts collected by R. C. Miller from the volumes of *Likkutei Siĥot* on the subject of the Seven Noahide Commandments. See *Likkutei Siĥot*.

Kometz Minĥa. Additions to Minhat Ĥinuĥ by its author. See Minĥat Ĥinuĥ.

Korban Ha'aidah. Commentary on the Jerusalem Talmud, by R. David Frankel of Berlin (c.1704-1762).

Korban Netanel. Commentary on *Rosh* by R. Netanel Weil of Karlsruhe, Germany (1687-1769).

Kraiti U'Plaiti. Explanations on *Yoreh De'ah*, by R. Yonatan Eibschutz of Prague and Hamburg (1690-1764).

Kuzary. A basic work of Torah fundamentals, written as the dialogue between a Rabbi and the Khazar king, Bulan; by R. Judah Halevi of Spain (c.1080-c.1145).

Leĥem HaPanim. Additions to *Kitzur Shulĥan Aruĥ* by the author, R. Shlomo Ganzfreid of Ungar, Hungary (1804-1886).

Leĥem Mishneh. Commentary on Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Avraham di Boton of Salonika, Greece (1545-1588).

Le'Or HaHalaĥa. Torah laws on modern issues, by R. Shlomo Yosef Zevin of Jerusalem (1888-1978).

Levush (*Levush Malchut*). Codification of Torah laws with customs of Eastern European Jews, by R. Mordeĥai Yafe HaCohen (c.1530-1612) of Prague and Pozna.

Light in the Closet: Torah, Homosexuality and the Power to Change. Treatise on forbidden sexual behaviors, gender confusion, and emotional brokenness, in a Torahbased mental health approach, by Arthur Goldberg (Director of JONAH).

Likkutei Siĥot. Transcriptions of extemporaneous Torah lectures by R. Menaĥem Mendel Schneerson (the Lubavitcher Rebbe, Brooklyn, New York, 1902-1994).

Living Torah, *The.* A modern and accurate English translation of the Pentateuch (pub. Moznaim), by the scholar and scientist R. Aryeh Kaplan (U.S., 1935-1983).

Ma'adanei Eretz. Notes on Mishnah *Zera'im*, by R. Shlomo Zalman Aurbach of Jerusalem, Israel (1910-1995).

Ma'agal Tov. Diary of R. Ĥayim Yosef David Azulai of Jerusalem (1724-1807), also known as *Ĥida*.

Mabit. Responsa of R. Moshe ben Yosef Tarani of Safed (Tzfat), Israel (1505-1580).

Magen Avraham. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Oraĥ Ĥayim*, by R. Avraham HaLevi Gombiner (1634-1682) of Kalisch, Poland.

Maggid Mishneh. Explanations on Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Vidal of Toulouse, Spain (13th century).

Maĥaneh Efraim. Book of Torah laws by R. Efraim Navon of Jerusalem and Kushta (1677-1735), based on Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*.

Maĥaneh Ĥayim. Responsa by R. Ĥayim Sofer of Munkatch, Hungary (1822-1886). *Maĥzor Vitry*. Decisions and rules concerning Jewish religious practice, by R. Simĥah ben Shmuel from Vitri, France (d. 1105).

Maharam Alsheiĥ. Responsa by R. Moshe ben Ĥayim Alsheiĥ (1508-1593) of Tzefat, Israel. Ordained by R. Yosef Karo, and a teacher of R. Ĥayim Vital.

Maharam Mintz. Responsa by R. Moshe Halevi Mintz, Germany/Poland (1415-1480). **Maharam Mi'Rutenburg.** R. Meir of Rutenburg, Germany (c.1215-1293); Rabbi and teacher of Rosh, and an author of *Tosefot* on the Talmud.

Maharam Shik. Responsa by R. Moshe Shik (or Shick), Hungary (1807-1879).

Maharil. Responsa by R. Ya'acov Molin of Mainz, Germany (c.1365-1427).

Maharit. Acronym for Moreinu HaRav Yosef Trani, Head of the Yeshiva and Chief Sephardic Rabbi in Constantinople (1568-1639). His responsa is titled *Shu"t Maharit*.

Maharitz Ĥayot. See Chajes, R. Tzvi Hirsch

Maharsha. Acronym for Moreinu HaRav Shlomo Eidels of Ostroh, Poland (1555-1632); Rabbi and Head of Yeshivas in a number of the leading communities of Poland, and author of monumental commentaries on the Torah-law and Aggadic sections of the Babylonian Talmud.

Maharshag. Acronym for R. Shimon Greenfield of Hungary (1860-1930).

Maharshal. Acronym for Moreinu HaRav Shlomo Luria (1510-1573), one of the leading Rabbis in Poland; author of numerous works on Talmud and Torah Law, including *Yam Shel Shlomo*.

Maharsham. Acronym for R. Sholom Mordechai Hacohen of Galicia (1835-1911), author of notes on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Yoreh De'ah*, titled *Da'at Torah*.

Malbim. Acronym for R. Meir Leibush ben Yeĥiel Miĥel Weiser, Rabbi in Germany, Romania, and Russia (1809-1879); a leading Torah scholar and one of the preeminent commentators of modern times on the Hebrew Scriptures, including proofs on how the Oral Tradition is implicit in the Hebrew text.

Maishiv Davar. Responsa by R. Naftali Zvi Yehudah Berlin. See Netziv.

Ma'or Veshemesh. Ĥassidic insights on Torah by R. Klonimus Kalman Epstein of Cracow, Poland (d. 1823). He was a student of R. Elimelech of Lizansk.

Margaliot Hayam. Commentary on Tractate *Sanhedrin* by R. Reuven Margolios of Tel Aviv, Israel (1889-1971).

Maskil Le'David. Explanations on Pentateuch and Rashi's commentary by R. David Pardo, Chief Rabbi of Sarajewo (1718-1790). See *Ĥasdei David*.

Match Aharon. Responsa by R. Aharon Halevi; pub. in Thessaloniki, Greece, 1810.

Meĥilta. The earliest commentary on the Book of Exodus, by the school of Rabbi Yishmael (a *Tanna* Sage, c. 120, who is quoted widely in the Talmud).

Meiri. R. Menachem ben Shlomo (1249-1316) of Provence, France; author of *Beit HaBeĥirah*, an encyclopedic Talmud commentary that encompassed earlier works.

Mekor Ĥayim. Book of Torah law by R. Yaakov Lorberbaum of Lissa (1760-1832).

Meromei Sadeh. Commentary on Talmud by R. Naftali Tzvi Yehuda Berlin, Dean of the famous Torah Academy of Volozin, Lithuania (1817-1893).

Mesheĥ Ĥoĥma. Torah insights by R. Meir Simcha Hacohen of Dvinsk (1843-1926). *Metzudot David.* Commentary on the Hebrew Scriptures by R. David Altshuler of Prague (17th century C.E.).

Midrash. A generic term for non-legalistic teachings of the Sages of the Talmudic era, mostly collected in the centuries after the completion of the Babylonian Talmud.

Midrash Hagadol. Midrashic anthology arranged by R. David al-Adeni of southern Arabia (13th century). Many Midrashic teachings have been preserved in this work. First printed in 1967 in Jerusalem.

Midrash Rabbah. A major collection of homilies and commentaries on the Torah, ascribed to R. Oshiah Rabbah (c. 3rd century), perhaps assembled during the early Gaonic period. First printed in Constantinople in 1512.

Midrash Shloshim u'Shtayim Midot. A section of Mishnat Rabbi Eliezer.

Midrash Tanĥuma. Collection of Midrashic teachings from R. Tanĥuma (c. 5th ct). *Milĥamot (Hashem).* Disputes by Ramban on Torah-law issues, in defense of the views of R. Yitzĥak Alfasi of Morocco. See **Ramban** and **Rif**.

Miluim. Notes on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Yoreh De'ah*, printed in Vilna, Lithuania in 1880.

Minhat Ĥinuĥ. Commentary on *Sefer HaĤinuĥ* by R. Yosef Babad (b. 1801 in Przeworsk, Poland; d. 1874 in Tzefat, Israel).

Minhat Shlomo. Responsa by R. Shlomo Zalman Aurbach (Jerusalem, 1910-1995), a leading Torah Law authority in Israel.

Minĥat Yitzĥak. By R. Yitzĥak Ya'akov Weiss (b. 1902 in Galicia, Poland; d. 1989 in Jerusalem, Israel); leading Rabbi in Grosswardein, Romania before WWII, and later in Manchester and Jerusalem, he was a world-renowned expert on Torah Law.

Mishbezot Zahav. A supercommentary on the *Turei Zahav* by R. Yosef Ben Meir Teomim (1727-1793).

Mishkenot Ya'akov. Responsa by R. Ya'acov (ben Aharon Bruĥin) of Karlin, Poland (19th century).

Mishnah. The basic written collection of the Oral Torah which preceded the Talmud; collected and compiled by R. Yehuda *HaNasi* (the Prince) in consultation with the members of his academy, c. 270.

Mishnah Aĥarona. Commentary on Mishnah by R. Ephraim Yitzĥak of Presmisil, Galicia (1762-1843). His other work in this series is *Mishnah Rishona*.

Mishnah Berurah. Explanations on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Oraĥ Ĥayim* by R. Yisroel Meir Hacohen Kagan of Radin, Poland. He is also referred to by the name of his book on the Torah laws of proper speech, *Ĥofetz Ĥayim* (1838-1933).

Mishnah Rishona. See Mishnah Aĥarona.

Mishnat Rabbi Eliezer. Collection of Midrashic teachings by R. Eliezer ben R. Yossi HaGlili (a *Tanna* Sage, c. 200).

Mishneh Li'Meleĥ. Commentary on the *Mishneh Torah* of Rambam, by R. Yehuda Rosanes, Chief Rabbi of Constantinople, Turkey (1658-1727).

Mishneh Torah. Rambam's comprehensive code of Oral Torah precepts for the 613 Jewish Commandments, in 14 volumes. See **Rambam**.

Misgeret HaShulĥan. Notes and additions by R. Ĥayim Yeshaya HaCohen Halbersberg (Poland, 19th century), on *Kitzur Shulĥan Aruĥ*.

Mitzvot Hashem. Scholarly work of essays on the 613 Jewish Commandments and 7 Noahide Commandments, by R. Yonatan Shteif (1877-1959). He was the Rav in Budapest, Hungary, before WWII, and later a leading Rabbi in New York City.

Mordeĥai. A classic book of Talmudic scholarship by R. Mordeĥai ben Hilel Ashkenazi of Nuremberg, Germany (1250-1298).

Mystical Tradition, The. By R. J. Immanuel Schochet of Toronto, Canada (a contributor to this work); pub. Kehot, Brooklyn, New York.

Naĥalat Ya'akov. Sermons by R. Ya'akov ben Ya'akov Moshe Lorberbaum (1760-1832), Chief Rabbi of Lissa, Germany (now in Poland).

Nekudot HaKesef. Gloss on Taz (Yoreh De'ah); by the author of $Sha\hat{h}$. See $Sha\hat{h}$.

Nemukai Yosef. Commentary by R. Yosef Ibn Haviva of Spain (15th century), on *Sefer HaHalahot* by Rabbi Yitzhak Alfasi (known as Rif). See **Rif**.

Netivot HaMishpat. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat* by R. Ya'akov ben Ya'akov Moshe Lorberbaum (1760-1832), Chief Rabbi of Lissa (now in Poland).

Netziv. Acronym of R. Naftali Zvi Yehudah Berlin, head of the famous Academy of Volozin, Lithuania; author of major works of Torah law and insights (1816-1893).

Nissim Gaon, Rav. Leading Rabbi in Kairouan, Tunisia (990-1062). He wrote a commentary on the Talmud Tractate *Beraĥot*.

Nodah Bi'Yehudah. Responsa by R. Yeĥezkel Landau, Chief Rabbi of Prague (1713-1793).

Orĥot Ĥayim. Compilation of numerous Torah laws, by R. Aharon ben Yaakov HaKohen of Lunel Provence (1280-1330); exiled from France to Spain in 1307.

Or HaĤayim. Commentary on the Torah by Rabbi Ĥayim ibn Attar of Israel (b. 1696 in Morocco; d. 1743 in Jerusalem).

Or Same'aĥ. Commentary on *Mishneh Torah*, by R. Meir Simcha Hakohen, Rabbi in Dvinsk, Latvia (1843-1926).

Otzar HaPoskim. Digital database of responsa on Shulĥan Aruĥ, pub. in Israel.

Ovadiah Mi'Bartenura. Rabbi in Bertinoro, Italy (d. circa 1500). He wrote an extensive and classic commentary on the Mishnah, which is known by his name.

Panim Meirot. Responsa by R. Meir Eisenstadt of Hungary (1670-1744).

Panim Yafot. Commentary on the Pentateuch by R. Pinchas Horowitz (1730-1805); a leading Torah scholar of the eighteenth century, and Rabbi in Frankfurt-am-main.

Parshat Deraĥim. Essays by R. Yehudah Rozenes of Turkey (1657-1727).

Pe'ar Hador, Responsa. A responsa by Rambam. See Rambam.

Perisha. A commentary on *Tur* by R. Yehoshua Falk Katz of Poland (c. 1555-1614).

Perush HaMishna. Rambam's commentary on the Mishnah. See Rambam.

Pirkei Avot. See Ethics of the Fathers.

Pirkei Rebbe Eliezer. Midrash composed by the school of R. Eliezer ben Hyrcanus (a *Tanna* Sage, c. 100).

Pisĥei Teshuva. Digest of responsa arranged according to the order of the *Shulĥan Aruĥ* (excluding *Oraĥ Ĥayim*), by R. Avraham Tzvi Hirsch Eisenstadt, Rabbi of Utian, Lithuania (1831-1868).

Piske HaRosh. See Rosh.

P'nei Yehoshua. Responsa and insights on Talmud by R. Yaakov Yehoshua Falk Katz of Germany (1680-1755).

Ponoviz'er Rav. Rabbi Shlomo Yosef Kahanaman, Dean of Ponovish Yeshiva in Bnei Brak, Israel (1886-1969).

Pri Ĥadash. A commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Yoreh De'ah* by R. Ĥizkia Da Silva of Jerusalem (1659-1698).

Pri HaSadeh. Responsa by R. Eliezer Ĥayim Deitch, a Rav in Hungary, early 1900s.

Pri Megadim. Supercommentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ* commentaries *Magen Avraham*, *Turei Zahav*, and *Sifsei Cohen*, by R. Yosef Teomim (1727-1792), Head of the Rabbinical court in Lemberg, Poland, and Rabbi in Frankfurt an der Oder.

Ra'anaĥ. Acronym for R. Eliyahu ben Ĥayim, Chief Rabbi of Constantinople, Turkey (c.1530-1613).

Ra'avad (III). Acronym for R. Abraham ben David of France (1125-1198); a leading Torah scholar, famous for his critical notes on *Mishneh Torah* of Rambam.

Rabbeinu Baĥyai. R. Bachyai ben Asher of Spain, student of Rashba, and author of a commentary on the Pentateuch containing the plain meaning of the text, and Midrashic, philosophical and Kabbalistic exegeses (1263-1340).

Rabbeinu Ĥananel. R. Ĥananel ben Ĥushiel of Kairouan, Tunisia, who authored a commentary on Talmud (990-1053).

Rabbeinu Yonah. R. Yona ben Avraham Gerondi, a Catalan Rabbi and moralist, and most famous for his ethical work, *The Gates of Repentance* (d. 1263).

Radak. Acronym for R. David Kimĥi of France, author of one of the most important commentaries on the Hebrew Scriptures (1160-1235).

Radvaz. Acronym for R. David Ibn Zimra (c.1480-1573), Chief Rabbi of Egypt and a leading Rabbis of his time; his responsa collection is called by his acronym.

Ramah. Acronym for R. Meir Halevi Aboulafia of Burgos, Spain (c.1170-1244); author of Talmud commentary *Yad Ramah* on Tractates *Sanhedrin* and *Bava Batra*.

Rambam. Acronym for R. Moshe ben Maimon (Maimonides); b. 1135 in Cordova, Spain; d. 1204 in Cairo Egypt. One of the leading Rabbis of the Middle Ages. His three major works are: *Commentary to the Mishnah*; *Mishneh Torah*, a comprehensive code of Oral Torah precepts for the 613 Jewish Commandments; and *Moreh Nevuĥim* (*Guide for the Perplexed*), a major work of Jewish philosophy.

Ramban. Acronym for Rabbi Moshe ben Nachman (Nachmanides) of Gerona, Spain, and the leading Rabbi of Spain in his time (1194-1270); successfully defended Judaism at the dramatic disputation in Barcelona in 1263; author of numerous basic works in all aspects of Torah, including a classic commentary on the Pentateuch.

Ran. Acronym for R. Nissim ben Reuven of Gerona and Barcelona, Spain, who is famous for his Talmudic commentary (1320-1380).

Rash Mi'Shantz. Acronym for R. Shimshon ben Avraham of Sens, France; a third generation author of *Tosefot*, as well as commentary on Mishnah (late 1100's-1230).

Rashba. Acronym for R. Shlomo ibn Aderet of Barcelona, Spain (1235-1310). He was the leading Rabbinic figure in Spain after Ramban, and author of many classic works in all branches of Torah learning, including thousands of responsa dealing with all aspects of Hebrew Scriptures, Talmud, Torah Law and Midrash.

Rashbatz. Acronym for R. Shimon ben Tzemaĥ Duran; born in Majorca, Spain, and later moved to Algiers, where he served on the Rabbinical court (1361-1444).

Rashi. Acronym for R. Shlomo Yitzĥaki of Germany and France (1040-1105), the most important commentator on the Hebrew Bible and Talmud. His brilliant commentaries are concise explanations of the traditional plain meaning of the text.

Rav Pe'alim. Responsa by R. Yosef Ĥayim, Chief Rabbi of Baghdad (1834-1909).

Re'aim. Acronym for R. Eliezer of Metz, author of *Ye'raim*, a compilation of Torah laws based on the 613 Jewish commandments (1114-1189).

Rema. Acronym for R. Moshe Isserles, Rabbi and Rosh Yeshiva of Cracow, Poland (1530-1572); most famous for his Ashkenazic annotations to *Shulĥan Aruĥ*, which transformed this predominantly Sephardic work into a universal Code of Jewish Law.

Rif. Acronym for R. Yitzĥak Alfasi of Morocco, author of an abridgement of the Talmud which serves as a practical code of Torah Law (1013-1103).

Ritva. Acronym for R. Yom Tov ibn Asevilli, author of an important work on the Talmud. The author was Rabbi in Saragossa Spain, and was considered the Chief Rabbi of Spanish Jewry in his generation (1248-1330).

Riva. Acronym for R. Yitzĥak ben Asher (France, 12th ct.); Pentateuch commentary. **Rivash.** Acronym for the Spanish Torah-law authority R. Yitzhak ben Shashet Perfet, who authored responsa called by his name. He settled in Algiers (1326-1408).

Rokei'aĥ. Torah-law guide by R. Eliezar ben Yehudah of Germany (1176-1238).

Rosh. Acronym for R. Asher ben Yeĥiel, a disciple of Maharam from Rottenberg, Germany (c.1250-1327). He was forced to flee from Germany to Spain, where he became Chief Rabbi of Toledo and a prominent *Rishon* Torah authority.

Sa'adia Gaon, Rabbi. Head Rabbi of the famous Yeshiva of Pumbedisa, Babylonia (882-942). He was a zealous opponent of Karaitism, and author of many works in all areas of Torah learning, including the philosophical work, *Emunot v'De'ot*, an Arabic translation of the Pentateuch, and a commentary on *Sefer Yetzirah*.

S'dei Ĥemed. Encyclopedia of Jewish Law, a monumental work of Torah Law by Rabbi Ĥayim Ĥezkiah Medini of Jerusalem and Hebron (1832-1904).

Seder Eliyahu Rabbah [and **Zuta**]. First [and second] part of **Tanna DeVei Eliyahu**. **Sefer HaĤinuĥ**. Classic work on the 613 commandments, their details and rationale, by an anonymous author in Spain (presumed to be R. Aharon Halevi, c.1235-c.1300).

Sefer Ha'Ikarim. A major work on Jewish philosophy and theology, by R. Yosef Albo (1357-1445). The author was Rabbi of Daroca and Soria in Spain.

Sefer HaMitzvos. Rambam's listing and explanation of the 613 eternal Jewish Commandments, with a seminal preface explaining the principles for determining which of the Torah's directives are to be included in this list. See **Rambam**.

Sefer Ĥasidim. Early ethical and Kabbalistic work, by R. Yehudah He'Ĥasid of Regensburg, Germany (1140-1217).

Sefer Meirat Einayim. A fundamental commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat* by R. Yehoshua Falk Katz of Poland (c.1555-1614).

Sefer Mitzvot Gadol (SMa"G). Work of Torah Law on the 613 Jewish Commandments, by R. Moshe of Coucy, France (1198-1274).

Sefer Mitzvot Katan (SMa"K). Torah-law work on the Torah's commandments by Rabbi Ya'akov of Corbeil, France (1206-1280). He was a member of the school that compiled the Tosafot commentary on Talmud. See **Tosafot**.

Sefer Toldot Adam V'Ĥavah. Book of Torah Law by Rabbenu Yeruĥam of Spain (14th century).

S'fat Emet. Novella on the Talmud, by R. Yehuda Leib Alter (1847-1905), the second Rebbe of Gur and a leader of Polish Jewry.

Sforno. R. Ovadiah Sforno of Rome and Bologna, Italy (1470-1550); he authored a classic commentary on the Pentateuch which is called by his name.

Sha'agat Aryeh. Responsa by R. Aryeh Leib Ginzburg of Metz, France (1700-1785).

Sha'alee Tzion Kama. Responsa by R. Dov Eliezrov of Jerusalem (1908-1997).

Sha'ar Ephraim. Responsa by R. Ephraim HaCohen of Vilna (1616-1678).

Sha'ar HaMeleĥ. Insights by R. Yitzĥak ben Moshe Nuñez Belmonte of Smyrna (late 18th - early 19th century), on Torah laws in Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*.

Sha'ar Yosef. Responsa of R. Ĥayim Yosef David Azulai (see Ĥida).

Sha'arei Teshuva. (*The Gates of Repentance*) Book of Torah ethics by Rabbeinu Yonah of Gerona (1180-1263).

Sha'arei Teshuva Oraĥ Ĥayim. Commentary on *Oraĥ Ĥayim* section of *Shulĥan Aruĥ*, begun by R. Ĥayim Mordeĥai Margolioth (d. 1823), and completed by his brother, R. Ephraim Zalman Margolioth. They were leading Rabbis in Poland.

Shav Yaakov. Responsa by R. Yaakov ben Binyamin Hakohen Poppers of Frankfurt am Main, Germany (d. 1740).

Shaĥ. Acronym of *Siftei Kohen*, a major Torah-law commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ*, *Yoreh De'ah* and *Ĥoshen Mishpat*, by R. Shabbetai ben Meir HaKohen, a noted authority on Torah Law (b. 1621, Vilna, Lithuania; d. 1662, Holleschau, Moravia).

She'iltot. Book of Torah law by the post-Talmudic Sage, R. Aĥai Gaon (c.680-c.762).

Sheva Mitzvot HaShem. Torah-based Noahide code by R. Moshe Weiner, Jerusalem.

Shevet HaLevi. Responsa by R. Shmuel Wosner of Bnei Brak, Israel (b. 1913).

Shevut Ya'akov. Responsa by R. Yaacov Richer Bechofen of Prague (1670-1736).

Sh'ilat Ya'avetz. Responsa by R. Yaakov Emden of Germany, a leading Rabbi and prominent opponent of the Sabbateans (1697-1776).

Shiltei Giborim. Notes on Rif (Rabbi Yitzhak Alfasi), by the prominent Talmudist R. Yehoshua Boaz of Spain and Italy (d. 1557).

Shita Mekubetzet. Collection of commentaries on Talmud by R. Betzalel Ashkenazi of Egypt (16th century).

Shneur Zalman of Liadi, Rabbi. A leading Torah-law authority and Ĥassidic Rebbe who settled in Liadi, Russia (1745-1813); founder of the Lubavitch Ĥassidic dynasty, and Ĥabad Ĥassidic philosophy based on teachings of R. Baal Shem Tov.

Sho'el U'Maishiv. Responsa by R. Yosef Shaul Natanson, Lemberg (1810-1875).

Shteif, R. Yonatan. See Mitzvot Hashem.

Shulhan Aruh. The Code of Jewish Law by R. Yosef Karo (1488-1575); it has four parts: *Orah Ĥayim*, *Yoreh De'ah*, *Even Ha'Ezer*, and *Ĥoshen Mishpat*.

Shulĥan Aruĥ HaRav. An updated Code of Jewish Law, authored by R. Shneur Zalman of Liadi, Russia (1745-1813).

Sifra, Torat Kohanim. Tannaite Torah-law Midrash to the Book of Leviticus; also known as *Torat Kohanim*; collected and edited by Rav, a Babylonian *Tanna* Sage.

Sifri. Tannaite Torah-law Midrash on the Books of Numbers and Deuteronomy.

Simla Ĥadasha. Comprehensive guide to the Torah laws of *kosher* slaughter, by R. Alexander Sender Schor of Zolkiew, Galicia (1660-1737).

Soloveichik, R. Ĥayim. Rav of Brisk (1853-1918); explanations on *Mishneh Torah*.

Sridei Aish. Responsa by R. Yeĥiel Yaakov Weinberg of Germany (1878-1966).

Tanna DeVei Eliyahu. Early Midrashic work in two parts (*Rabbah* and *Zuta*) attributed to teachings of the prophet Elijah (Eliyahu), first printed in Venice, 1598.

Targum Onkelos. Authoritative Aramaic translation of the Pentateuch by the proselyte Onkelos from Rome (c. 90). This interpretive translation earned the approbation of his teachers, the *Tanna* Sages R. Eliezer and R. Yehoshua.

Targum Yonatan. Aramaic paraphrase of the Pentateuch, attributed to R. Yonatan ben Uziel, a disciple of Hillel (c. 1st century).

Tashbatz. See Rashbatz.

Taz. Acronym for *Turei Zahav*, a commentary by R. Dovid ben Shmuel HaLevi on the *Shulĥan Aruĥ*. He was a foremost Rabbinical authority in Poland (1586-1667).

Tehillat HaShem. Orthodox Jewish prayer book, arranged in the style of the tradition of the AriZal, by R. Shneur Zalman; pub. Kehot., Brooklyn, New York.

Terumat Hadeshen. Responsa by R. Yisrael Isserlin of Vienna, Austria (1400's).

Tiferet Yisrael. Comprehensive commentary on the Mishnah, by R. Yisrael Lifshitz, a leading Rabbi in a number of Jewish communities in Germany (1782-1860).

Tiferet Yisrael. Essays by R. Yehudah Loewe ben Betzalel (1526-1609), one of the great figures in Jewish thought in the last five centuries. He served as Chief Rabbi in Moravia, Posen, and Prague, and was an author of many works in all fields of Torah.

Tikkune Zohar. Zohar literature, consisting of 70 chapters on the first word of the Torah (*Bereishit*, "In the beginning") by the school of R. Shimon bar Yoĥai (a *Tanna* Sage); contains some of the most important discussions in Kabbalah. See *Zohar*.

Torah Temimah. Encyclopedic Torah commentary by R. Boruĥ Epstein of Lithuania (1860-1941). The work is noteworthy for quoting all the main Talmudic references to a verse, and offering extensive commentary on them.

Torat Ben Noah. Commentary on *Mishneh Torah, Laws of Kings*, by R. Ephraim Bilitser of Hungary (1891-1944).

Torat Ĥesed. Responsa by R. Shneur Zalman Fradkin of Lublin (1830-1902).

Torat Habayit. Important Torah-law work by Rashba relating to the section of *Yoreh De'ah*. See **Rashba**.

Torat Kohanim. See Sifra.

Tosafot. Talmudic glosses by leading French Rabbis of the 12th and 13th centuries on the Babylonian Talmud; printed in all editions alongside the text of the Talmud.

Tosafot Rosh. A classic commentary on Talmud by R. Asher ben Yeĥiel. See Rosh.

Tosafot Rid. Commentary on Talmud by R. Yeshaya of Tirani, Italy (1165-1240).

Tosefet Yom HaKippurim. Insights on Tractate *Yoma* by R. Moshe Ben Ĥaviv, Chief Rabbi of Jerusalem (1654-1696).

Tosefta. Collection of *Baraita* writings attributed to R. Ĥiya (a *Tanna* Sage) and his academy (as cited in *Iggeret Rabbi Shrira Gaon*).

Tumim. See Urim v'Tumim.

Tur. Code of Jewish Law composed by Rabbi Ya'akov ben Asher (known as Rosh), Toledo, Spain (c.1275-c.1340). The *Arba Turim* (which is its full title) is composed of four parts: *Tur Oraĥ Ĥayim, Tur Yoreh De'ah, Tur Even HaEzer*, and *Tur Ĥoshen Mishpat*. This work forms the basis for the *Shulĥan Aruĥ*.

Tzafnat Pane'aĥ. Torah commentary as well as a commentary on the Rambam and responsa by R. Yosef Rozin, also known as the Rogatchover Gaon (1858-1936). One of the greatest Torah geniuses of his time, and Rabbi of Dvinsk, Latvia.

Tzafnat Pane'aĥ Tinyana. Second edition of Tzafnat Pane'aĥ on Mishneh Torah.

Tzemaĥ Tzedek (the first). Responsa by R. Menaĥem Mendel Kroĥmal, a leading Rabbi of Moravia, Prossnitz and Nikolsburg (c. 1600-1661).

Tzemaĥ Tzedek. Responsa by R. Menaĥem Mendel Shneersohn, the third Rebbe of Lubavitch in Russia (1789-1866).

Tzitz Eliezer. Responsa by R. Eliezer Yehuda Waldenberg, a Jerusalem Torah scholar and member of the Jerusalem Rabbinic Court of Appeals (d. 2006).

Tzlaĥ (*Tzion Le'Nefesh Ĥaya*). A commentary on several tractates of the Talmud by R. Yeĥezkel Landau (1713-1793), Chief Rabbi of Prague and author of the responsa *Nodah Bi'Yehudah*. See *Nodah Bi'Yehudah*.

Urim v'Tumim. Commentary on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat* by R. Yonatan Eibshutz of Prague and Hamburg (1690-1764).

Yaarot Devash. Sermons by R. Yonatan Eibschutz (1690-1764). See Urim v'Tumim.

Yad Avraham. Insights on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Yoreh De'ah*, by R. Avraham Maskileison, a leading Torah scholar of Novogrudok and Minsk (1788-1848).

Yad Eliyahu. Responsa by R. Eliyahu ben Shmuel of Lublin (d. 1735 in Hebron).

Yad Ramah. Title of commentary on Tractates *Sanhedrin* and *Bava Batra* by R. Meir Halevi Aboulafia of Burgos, Spain (c.1170-1244). See **Ramah**.

Yam Shel Shlomo. Major treatise of Torah law by R. Shlomo Luria. See **Maharshal**. *Yehuda Ya'aleh*. Responsa by R. Yehuda Assad of Slovakia (d. 1866).

Yeshu'ot Yisrael. Notes on *Shulĥan Aruĥ Ĥoshen Mishpat* by R. Yisrael Yehoshua Trunk, a great Torah scholar who served as Rabbi of Kutna, Galicia (1821-1893).

Yosef Ibn Migash (ben Meir Halevi). Leading Rabbi and Head of the Yeshiva in Lucena, Spain (1077-1141). He was a student of Rif, and his most famous student was probably Maimon, the father of Maimonides (Rambam).

Zeĥer Yitzĥak. Responsa by R. Yitzĥak Ya'acov Rabinowitz of Ponivish (d. 1919).

Zohar. The basic work of *Kabbalah*, compiled by R. Shimon ben Yochai and his disciples (c. 2nd century) in the form of a commentary on the Pentateuch and the *Megillot* of the Hebrew Scriptures. Hidden for centuries, it was first published in the late-thirteenth century by Rabbi Moshe de Leon (c.1250-1305), in Spain.

Zohar Ĥadash. Kabbalistic Midrash which is part of the Zohar. See **Zohar**.
